PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

► Dear St Joseph's Flexi Community

Werte. My name is Rob, and I am the new principal at St. Joseph's Flexi. My wife Kathy and I have spent the last two years at Ltyentye Apurte Catholic School, Santa Teresa. I was the Deputy Principal and Principal, and Kathy was Classroom Teacher / Religious Education Co-ordinator. Kathy and I have been teaching for 40 years in both Queensland and the Northern Territory including teaching at many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island communities. We have thoroughly enjoyed our time so far at St Joseph's. I have spent a lot of time in classrooms and can confidently report that we are a place of learning and programs, and pathways are in place for our young people to develop their education.

An Annual School Improvement Plan (ASIP) has been completed in collaboration with all staff to ensure we have direction for the year ahead. Junior teachers Raewyn and Sophie have created very attractive learning environments and have started 'Bump It Up Walls' to track student achievement. Senior teachers Andrea and Graham are getting great numbers in their classes, and they are mapping students progress and providing pathways for students to either graduate with a Year 12 certificate or develop skills to enhance their job opportunities. Teachers are very well supported by Education Support Officers and Youth Workers. Our school is fortunate to have Jannette and Roshan organising the administrative side of things and Meg our chef is providing delicious food for our young people. Kathy is tracking student achievement and has tested over 50 students in Maths and Reading. She has created data walls to track attendance and student progress. Mel has worked well in the Inclusion space and has been busy supporting our students, both in the classroom and with educational support. Data Informed Practice will be a focus for 2025 and beyond.

The continued promotion of Aboriginal culture and identity will be a focus this year and has been identified as an area in our School Improvement Plan. To promote Catholic Identity and Mission, our staff will be involved in a 'Pilgrims of Hope' staff formation day facilitated by Catholic Education Northern Territory. Kathy will set up prayer tables to respectfully promote Catholic Identity. I encourage community members, parents, and carers to promote attendance and do all they can to get our young people to school. Our data is showing that high attendance results in higher achievement. Every day at school counts. Hopefully I will get to meet parents and community members at our Community Day on June 13th this term.

MOODITJ

This term we started part 1 - Mooditj Me, which helps young people grow their inner strengths, understand and have pride in their identity. The girls enjoyed the classes and began learning about who they are and what is important to them. They enjoyed and got involved in the weekly activities. We are looking forward to building on what they've learned next term.



COOKING PROGRAM

▶ Last term, our cooking program gave young people a chance to explore the world of cooking while learning about measurements. Students created pizzas, savory quiches, baked treats, and fried rice, gaining hands-on experience with ingredients and portioning. They practiced measuring accurately, ensuring each dish was delicious and well-balanced. The program encouraged teamwork, creativity, and practical skills, leaving students with a sense of accomplishment and newfound culinary confidence for future cooking adventures.





GIRLS CULTURE PROGRAM

▶ This term the ladies participated in the cultural program every Thursday afternoon. ▶ This semester, the fellas had the opportunity to develop an understanding of their own identity through our culture program facilitated from Dion Forrester, John Francois and Jake Turner. The focus has been on the young fellas using their listening and speaking skills to show an understanding of their own emotional and physical wellbeing. The fellas have also taken part in cultural outings around Central Australia where they participated in wellbeing on country. We are planning to work with services who will help us make tap sticks and boomerangs which we will display around our school.



► This term, the music program kicked back into gear with staff member Dion Forrester doing music lessons with many students who were trying music out for the first time. The program has given Young People the opportunity to participate in all thing's music such as, playing an instrument, podcasting, creating beats, technical set up and recording songs.
